Let us go now to the banquet, to the feast of the universe.

This is among my favorites from our red hymnal, and it is one we will be singing throughout our "Journey of Sharing", the theme for this year's stewardship campaign. This hymn tune is lively, and the text delights in the expansiveness of God's love for all people and for all creation. It is the love that we have been given to share and to embody. It is the love of opening our hands to welcome and to include and to support and to share.

Among Jesus' many miracles is the Feeding of the 5000 with five loaves and two fish. How Jesus turned one lunch basket into a feast for all, we cannot explain, but an important part of the story is how Jesus involves the disciples in this miracle. They cannot explain it either, but it was their hands that distributed the food, and it was their hands that collected up the leftovers, and it was their hands that participated in sharing. The disciples had assumed that there was not enough. Jesus opened their eyes and their hearts to look beyond scarcity to see possibility and even abundance.

In our life together, Jesus challenges us to start with these basic questions:

What do we have?

How can we share what we have?

Far too often, we focus on what we do not have and make assumptions about what we cannot do. Such a mindset tends to turn our attention inward rather than outward. When the disciples wanted to send the crowd away, Jesus turned their attention outward and invited them to share. It's one of the first lessons we learn as children. It's at the heart of who God created to be and how we are called to live as followers of Jesus Christ.

Benevolence to ELCA, Luther Park and LSS: \$7,061.67





McBride weaves important political and cultural milestones into her personal journey. She also found her first love and future husband, Andy Cray*, a trans man and fellow activist, who complemented her in every way, until cancer tragically intervened. As McBride urges: "We must never be a country that says there's only one way to love, only one way to look, and only one way to live."

September 17 is a day we will all not want to miss at Our Saviour's. Deacon Laura Ramlow of our Synod staff will be with us that day to preach at our worship service and lead our adult education hour. She, along with Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson and a few members of several of our synod's congregations, will have returned from visiting our companions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Malawi. Deacon Laura sent back letters that were posted and still available on our synod's Facebook page, that are not only informative but moving, even heartbreaking. She speaks of the pain and suffering brought to parts of the country by the storms and floods that destroyed homes, farms, crops and lives. Many of these are subsistence farmers whose fields have been buried under tons of boulders following the mudslides caused by the torrential rains. Malawi is a poor country with relief services that are inadequate for the need. People in the devastated villages look to the Lutheran church which continues, as it has for many years, serving the basic needs of feeding, educating and caring for all in need, whether members or not.

Deacon Laura in her first letter home wrote, "Dear friends, today I pray that we can pause long enough to see things through the eyes of others, that we stay curious, ask questions and experience new things, and that we have the courage to go out into the world and live the good news that ALL people will know they are beloved children of God."

Having Deacon Laura with us September 17 will draw us into what she has experienced in Malawi with our companions, helping each other to endure life's sufferings and enjoy its blessings, to see through each others' eyes that God is with us, and to remain faithful in Christ to bear one another's burdens.

They arrived at O'Hare International Airport on January 30th where they met their sponsors, Bryce and Maxine (Max) Luchterhand. They left Lviv, Ukraine, a city of over 700,000 people and entered a new way of life on a rural farm south of Curtiss, Wisconsin. A documentary that premiered at the Tribeca Film Festival in New York in June tells the story of their decision to leave and the arrival at the Luchterhand farm. The two families will explain their decision and the process involved on October 8th and show the documentary.

When a family with kids or pets is living out of their car and needs relief from the heat or cold, the CDC provides emergency shelter in local hotels. Donations may also be used to fill a car tank with gas or other areas of crisis support.


Seasonal: With an abundance of school supplies, the CDC now needs help filling backpacks to have available for the coming school year.

Fall is quickly approaching and a new energy is found within Troop 13. Every year, just before school starts, new youth leadership is put into place. This perpetual refresh gives the scouts a chance to try something new and put into practice the leadership skills they have learned in the past months. Troop 13 has remained very active through Spring and Summer. April presented the annual "new scout orientation" campout where the new scouts are able to work with more experienced scouts to develop their early scouting

skills to work towards their first rank, Scout. April weather was not kind to the campers who slept and played in the snow! May flowers soon sprung while the troop went to the council-wide Spring Camporee with many other scouts in the area. Here the troop practiced their scouting skills in a competition among the different troops and brought home the trophy for their excellent Leave No Trace skills by demonstrating that "a scout is clean" in a messy campsite competition. June sent many of the older scouts to National Youth Leadership Training for a weeklong course in leadership and character development. Shortly thereafter, we sent some scouts off to camp as counselors working with 100's of scouts throughout the summer at Camp Phillips. Many of the other scouts followed them to camp in July for a weeklong outing working on merit badges and everything else camp has to offer. While at camp, 4 members of Troop 13 were invited to become Order of the Arrow members, a group of scouts and scouters who focus and demonstrate cheerful service. Special congratulations go out to Will, Chris, Landon, and Brock. July also brought a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for scouts from the area to attend the National Jamboree in West Virginia where 1000's of scouts came together to enjoy everything that scouting has to offer.
